 Harvest to show thanks for all the food they have.
- People who follow a Hindu worldview generally believe in one God (Brahman) who can take on many forms.
- Some Hindu people worship in their home or in a mandir, with rituals including lighting incense, ringing a bell, offerings to murtis and lamp lighting.
- The UK Harvest Festival is a long-standing British tradition where people give thanks for the year's crop.
- Some Christians sing worship songs to say thank you to God.
- Harvest celebrations have different names and traditions. For example: South Asians celebrate Pongal, Jewish people celebrate Sukkot, people in Ghana celebrate Homowo and Thanksgiving is celebrated in the USA and Canada.
