Vocabulary

Word	Definition
Side effects	An undesirable effect of a drug or medical treatment.
prescribed	Advise and authorize the use of (a medicine or treatment) for someone, especially in writing.
Tobacco	Is a plant that can be smoked in cigarettes, pipes or cigars
alcohol	Is a liquid that is in beer, wine and spirits. It is a drug that changes the way you feel by changing the way the brain sends and receives messages to the rest of the body.
caffeine	A stimulant of the central nervous system found especially in tea and coffee plants.
abuse	Use (something) to bad effect or for a bad purpose; misuse.
neglect	Fail to care for properly.
punctual	Happening or doing something at the agreed or proper time.
contribution	A a gift or payment to a common fund or collection.
consequence	A result or effect, typically one that is unwelcome or unpleasant.
casualty	A person killed or injured
allergic	Caused by or relating to an allergy.
